1. **Fall Birding Field Trip** *Penny Ridderbusch & Clara Mason*
1 Wednesday, **Sept 16**, 8 AM→3 PM, Start from PT Park & Ride



Join us for a Fall birding trip to the Billy Frank Jr. Nisqually National Wildlife Refuge, a 4,000-acre estuary where the Nisqually River meets Puget Sound near Olympia. Fall migration brings the refuge's tidal marshes and wetlands to life with waterfowl and raptors traveling the Pacific Flyway.

Possible sightings include: Northern Pintails, American Wigeons, Green-Winged Teals, Great Blue Herons, Bald Eagles, Peregrine Falcons, and Merlins. The Twin Barns Loop Trail and elevated boardwalk provide easy, accessible walking with great views across the marsh and river delta.

Suitable for birders of all skill levels. Wear comfortable outdoor shoes and layered clothing. Bring binoculars. We will carpool from the Haines St. Park and Ride, with pickups in Pt. Hadlock and/or Pt. Ludlow on request.

Penny Ridderbusch has co-led several birding outings with Dave on the Olympic Peninsula and has birded in Nepal, Bhutan, South America, and the Southwest. **Clara Mason** has gone to bird festivals in Utah, Arizona, Alaska, and Texas. She has traveled to see birds in Mexico, Scotland, Argentina, Chile, Antarctica, and the most magical place on earth—South Georgia Island. 2. What's Happening with the Supreme Court (SCOTUS)? *Nils Pedersen & Joyce Francis*

This is our 7th annual case-based SCOTUS course, recapping highlights of the previous term of the U.S. Supreme Court and previewing the cases scheduled for the upcoming term. Additionally, we will consider how recent cases have impacted the public's perception of the Court.

The general plan of the four sessions is expected to be:

- Week 1 - Introduction of participants and their interests. Overview of the Oct 2025 term by court watchers and comparative data on the previous terms.
- Weeks 2 & 3 - Review of select major cases from the Oct 2025 term.
- Week 4 - Overview of select scheduled cases for the Oct 2026 term.

We hope participants will share the questions/concerns they have about the Court during the introduction, and we will seek to address those in the following sessions.

3. Bless the Horses: An Afternoon at Heron Hill Equine *Teren MacLeod*

1 Monday Afternoon, Sept 28, 2-3:30 PM, Heron Hill Equine



Join us for a 90-minute presentation and field trip into the world of horses. We'll start with an introduction to the herd and a little of Heron Hill's history, then talk through what makes horses so different from us — prey animals with instincts, sensitivities, and a way of reading us that most people never stop to consider.

There's plenty of room for questions and conversation along the way. From there, we'll get hands-on with the horses themselves — brushing, touching, and simply being with them, discovering what it is like to meet a completely authentic creature, in their own skin, with no agenda other than safety and survival. We'll close with Velda Thomas's "Bless the Horses" wisdom deck, drawing a card or two and talking through what comes up. Heron Hill Equine is a working-teaching barn with two resident horses. Participants are asked to wear comfortable outdoor clothing and solid footwear and will be required to sign a Liability Release Form.

Teren MacLeod is co-founder of Heron Hill Equine, a Washington non-profit on the Olympic Peninsula devoted to equine-assisted learning. She partners with the horses raised and retired there to exchange energy and connection across species with all ages and all interests. As a Hospice Specialist Volunteer, it is the horses that provide the real connection. She believes horses ask nothing of us but honesty and offer everything in return. 1 Wednesday, Sept 30, 9 AM→2 PM, Field Trip Starting from CUMC

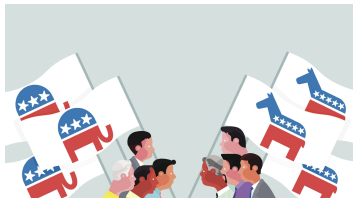

You will learn about the family dynamics of political differences, apply them to your family, and learn and practice effective communication skills with difficult family members. The Family and Politics workshop is open to everyone who struggles over political differences with a loved one.

6. In Pursuit of a Personal Cosmology *Gary Nelson & Doug Rodgers*

Envision this project as a more comprehensive version of “Building Your Own Theology.” We will explore discovering our own origin story, our personal theology, our notions of the nature of reality, the role of mind and consciousness, sources of meaning and values — a personal cosmology.

As sources, we will explore science, including controversial voices such as Michael Levin and Rupert Sheldrake, as well as more spiritual voices like Ram Dass, the Dalai Lama and the Gnostics. We will explore paths to spiritual knowledge and experience, including traditional religions and practices as well as psychedelics. The Process Relational Organic philosophy of Alfred North Whitehead and the Depth Psychology of Carl Jung will be part of the exploration with help from modern interpretations.

Each participant will have the opportunity to discuss one's own personal cosmology and to capture it on video for posting on the SSF website.

Gary Nelson earned a PhD in electrical engineering in 1972 and has no other formal qualifications for this project other than a lifetime of personal exploration, including being introduced at age five to his Indian spirit guide by his trance medium grandmother. 7. Exploring Bainbridge Island

Join Kendra and Clara for a day exploring Bainbridge Island. We will begin with a visit to the Japanese American Exclusionary Museum that honors the first Japanese Americans to be forcibly removed from their community and incarcerated during World War II. It is an outdoor exhibit, a unit of the Minidoka National Historic Site in Idaho. Built of old-growth red cedar, granite and basalt, the exhibit wall honors the names of all 276 Japanese and Japanese Americans who were exiled from Bainbridge Island.

Then we will head over to the Marketplace at Pleasant Beach for lunch. Next is the History Museum near the Ferry Dock. This museum, housed in an original 1908 schoolhouse, tells the stories and history of Bainbridge Island. Finally, we will visit Sakai Park to discover “Pia the Peacemaker,” an 18-foot troll made from recycled materials and created by the renowned artist Thomas Dambo.

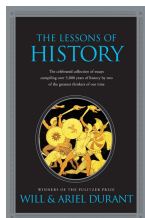

8. What are the Lessons of History & Do They Apply to Us?

In our high-tech age — with the world interconnected by a “web,” now enhanced by AI, and considering all of our technological achievements and prowess — is the study of history still relevant? One wag in the second Bush administration said “we don’t read history, we make history.” Is this more true now than it was in the late 1990s? What are the practical advantages of moral virtue versus coercive power in the world we inhabit?

Will and Ariel Durant spent a long four decades studying civilizations. The Durants, in their monumental 11-volume study, looked at 5,000 years of human history and focused on factors such as environmental change, migration, inequality, and competition between groups that shaped historical outcomes. They found recurring themes in social, political, and economic development. Are there general laws or continuities across societies and history?

We will look at their findings condensed by the Durants into approximately 120 pages and explore their relevance to our current world challenges. We will contemplate over three meetings together the above questions and wonder, “Are we, in the USA, an exception to history?”

To participate fully in this class, one must obtain the book “The Lessons of History” by Will and Ariel Durrant (approx. \$7.00 used online). Please have read the first five chapters before the first class. This class is a facilitated seminar, not a lecture, that relies on informed participants. 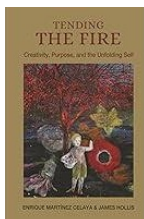

We live in a postmodern era in which many of the assumptions of science and modernity are being questioned and doubted. Our age is hungry for meaning, without which alienation and neuroses are lurking. Jung was the original anti-psychiatrist who designated society as mad.

By "religion" Jung means an attitude of reverence towards the whole of life, a sense of the sacred in the everyday, and openness towards the transcendent in self and others. He was not interested in weekly religious observance, but only in "the daily need of the soul."

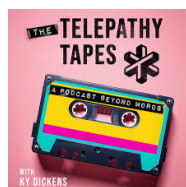
In this seminar (not a lecture), we will pursue Jung as the "original anti-psychiatrist" through our close reading of the book "How to Read Jung" by David Tacey. Participants must acquire the book to participate fully and have read through page 32 before the first meeting.

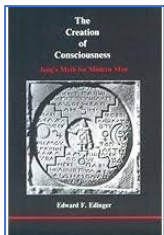

16. Waking Up: In Search of the Archetype of Wholeness

"The world today hangs by a thread, and that thread is the psyche of [humanity]," wrote Carl Jung. We have achieved the goal of living in interesting times. For the past 500 years or so, there has been a perceived conflict between religion and its linkage to God in science, which has sought knowledge — Eros vs. Logos. If we are to continue with any form of life on earth, perhaps the time is at hand to seek a "linked knowledge."

Carl Jung connected world religions, alchemical texts, ancient myths, modern dreams, and depth psychology to prove the existence of something universally shared. He showed that the human mind contains universal patterns called archetypes within a collective unconscious.

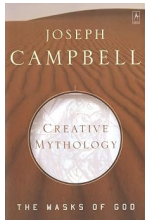
This four-week seminar (not a lecture) requires all participants to obtain the book "The Creation of Consciousness: Jung's Myth for Modern Man" by Edward Edinger, and have read chapter 1 prior to the first meeting.

17. The King, the Trail & The Wasteland

The wasteland is any world in which force, and not love, indoctrination, not education, authority, not experience prevail in the ordering of lives. The king has a wound that will not heal, resulting in a lack of fertility and eros; society is morally adrift, disconnected from its sacred foundations, earth, and the archetypal feminine. The king must be healed for the kingdom to thrive. Thus, the knights are sent on a quest, in search of healing.

Most of the Grail legends were written during a 125-year, politically tumultuous period in the late 12th and 13th Centuries. The first were pre-Christian of Celtic origin. In this class, we will explore Joseph Campbell's writings on the importance of these legends to the development of Western culture and their continued relevance to the times in which we currently live.

Please acquire the book "The Masks of God: Creative Mythology" by Joseph Campbell (between \$17 used to \$25 new online) for this six-week seminar and read pages 383 through 416 before the first class.
